River Coho

By John Martinis Is there a harder fish to catch than Puget Sound Coho in the local rivers? Think about it. We have mastered catching Chinook in the freshwater (albeit it is a challenge). We have mastered Sockeye in the We have excelled in catching Pinks in the rivers. What gives with Coho? We catch them. But, we really have never dialed them in like we have the other salmon species. We catch some on jigs, some on plugs, some on small spoons and some just by shear luck.

Let's take a look at river Coho and try to understand where they are going. First, we will take a look at the Snohomish River System. The Snohomish System is a vast watershed made up of these tributaries: Skykomish, Snoqualmie, Pilchuck, Wallace, Sultan and several smaller streams. Coho start migrating up the Snohomish River in September. Without too much rainfall these fish will slosh back and forth from Lowell to the City of Snohomish for several weeks. As the Fall rains intensify the water cools and the small creeks swell. This is the cue for Coho to make the next leg of their journey. In late September and early October, Coho can be found in the Skykomish and Snoqualmie Rivers.

The Stillaguamish River gets an early shot of Coho long before the river opens for Coho fishing. If the conditions are right (no rain), fishing can be good right from

when the river opens (September 1, this year) for Coho fishing. This year there was too much rain and the fish kept on heading up stream. In the Stilly System, the north and South Fork have always remained closed for all salmon fishing. So, you cannot follow these fish past the Haller Bridge in Arlington. There are more Coho in October. The only limiting factor is wet weather. It seems that the Stilly gets muddy if a cloud passes over it.

If you are looking for good beach access to the Stillaguamish River, go to Blue Stilly Park. *Click Here for map*.

The Snohomish River offers a great variety in fishing. You can troll in the lower river with plugs. You can get above the tide water and pitch spoons and spinners. The lower Snohomish River below the town of Snohomish is all tide The water is somewhat deep, it moves fast when the tide is going out and the water almost quits moving when the tide is coming in. This is ideal conditions for trolling. You can troll in the lower Snohomish without any fancy gear. All you need is a 12 foot boat or larger with a rod holder. You don't need any electronics or downriggers at all. All you need is a small tackle selection: Wiggle Wart plugs, Fire Tiger and Red Herring Bone, #3 & #4 Super Vibrax spinners, colors chartreuse and flame. You will also need a handful of ½ ounce trolling sinkers. See Map of Lower Snohomish and Boat Launches Click Here.

The trolling set-up is the same for the plugs and the spinners. Tie a six foot leader (10lb Leader) to the plug or spinner and to the sinkers. It's that simple. I know I do not have to tell you that the Hook Rules are very confusing for river fishing. For the Snohomish River the rule goes as follows: Sinking lures need to have single hooks. Period! Floating lures can have treble hooks. There are no "what ifs" to these rules. If you drop a lure in the water and it goes to the bottom, you must have single hooks on it. If you drop a lure into the water and it floats, you can have treble hooks on it. Yes, you can have barbed hooks in the Snohomish River. If you are using bait where it is legal to use, you must use a single hook. Bait is legal in the Snohomish River and the Skykomish Rivers.

The Stillaguamish River hook and bait rules are simple: Single barbless lures and no bait. The no bait rule includes bait oils and scented lures like Power Bait Worms or pink worms that are scented.

Trolling for Coho in the river is somewhat similar to trolling in the salt. Keep your speed up and look for seams in the water. What I mean by seams: There are mini tides lines in the river. Troll on the clean side of these tide lines. If the fish are coming through in good numbers, you will see them jumping and rolling on one side of the seam. When you get to the river, you will see exactly what I am describing. The correct distance to let the gear out behind the boat is 30-40 feet. If you are hitting the bottom, wind in few feet

of line. It is perfectly normal to troll both upstream and down stream.

Many anglers like to exclusively troll smaller lures for Coho. Do not be intimidated by their size. #1 50/50 Dick Nite spoons can be very effective. In fact, I believe that the #1 Dick Nite is the most effective lure for casting for Coho. This is one case when the old saying, "Big Lure, Big Fish" definitely does not apply.

Another effective way to fish for Coho: Many anglers have turned to jigs underneath a bobber. Colors of jigs that work well are black, pink, cerise or red. 1/8 ounce jigs are the preferred size. *Click here* to see a diagram for rigging with a float, Click Here.

If you want to get a jump start on Blackmouth/Chinook fish: October 1, Area 10 opens for Chinook fishing. The daily limit is two salmon and you must release wild Chinook. I would recommend fishing Jefferson Head or Apple Cove Point on the Area 10 side of Apple Cove Point. The November Newsletter will address Winter Blackmouth fishing in great detail.

Marine Area 7: is divided up into three Areas. Marine Area 7 South and East, opens for crab on July 14, at 7AM. This Area stays open through September 30. Open Wednesday through Saturday.

Thought you might like to see what happened when I used some gear you recommended on your newsletter. Thanks John! this was a solo trip, only one pole in the water.

DYNOMITE! I fished Westport 13 & 14 Sep I have never had such great fishing. Catch and release was required or I would have sank the boat and probably been thrown in jail. Sunday I checked the weather. bar, tides, on line reports. I saw that conditions would be just about perfect for my 17' fishing machine. The only surprise was it wasn't just a little fog first thing in the morning with the typical burnoff by 10am. Tuesday it was socked in on the water the whole day, you could see up at some clear

sky but not outward very far. I was headed out to the 250' depth, I saw a large group of birds at about the 200' line and popped in there instead. I wasn't disappointed, BAM! FISH ON! Ace Hi fly behind a green flasher down 30' of wire. 8-12 pound silvers was the norm, release wild coho. One fish after another with just enough time in between to snack and fiddle with the plotter. I called it a day by 10:30 since I was already looking at being awake 36 hours. Tuesday there were so many fish to catch and release I didn't have time to eat breakfast till I shut down the motor and stopped fishing just drifting out there, nearly the only boat within sight. Speed was always 3 1/2 + mph SOG. These fish slammed my lure several times on the surface before or while I was clipping them into the rigger, pulling the line right out my hand! Two whales breached close to the boat about a dozen times as they headed north, I could hear them, they were


HUGE. I suspect the salmon would have hit just about anything but since the Ace Hi worked, I didn't change it. LOL That would have just been stupid! LOL Season ends the 19th, just enough time to get one more run out there. Fish are always on the move, look for birds and drop a line! This spot is about 14 miles off shore, WxSW of buoy 6. After fishing Puget Sound last week with dismal results. this was way more than I had expected.
