February Chinook **Transition Month**

February is a transition month for salmon fishing in Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands. Most of the Chinook are still barely legal. There are still a boat load of shakers (sub-legal salmon) around and there are a few larger Chinook starting to be in the picture.

You have to fish farther from the boat launch in February if you want to catch larger fish. Sometimes you have to fish farther from the boat launch if you want to catch any fish at all.

Let's start with Puget Sound: To me there are three choices to fish. West Side of Possession Bar. 2) Useless Bay 3) Pilot Point.

If the tides do not line up correctly, you can fish the West side of Possession Bar on any tide. Stay in 90-120 feet of water and follow the bar south to the southern tip of the bar. See map, Click Here.

Pilot Point and Useless Bay are dependent on the tide coming in with one exception; I have done well at Useless Bay right after the tide gets high and starts to go out. Don't depend on that happening, but keep it as an option. Pilot Point only fishes well on a tide that is coming in and absolutely no other time.

Very unusual. So, I called Les and told him to get himself out of bed so that we could get heading down I-5 to beat the early morning rush hour traffic.

working on Les's truck. A minor inconvenience in a driving rain storm to say the least. I asked Les, "What's wrong with your windshield wipers?" Les said it was not a big deal, it happed yesterday too. "Come on Les pull over, I can' see the road," I asked. By now I cannot see out of the front windshield at all. Les pulls over to check-out what the problem might be with the wipers.

Les gets out of the truck. The strangest thing happened at this point. I looked out the side rear window and I saw Les running to the rear of the truck. Very strange, when I thought he going to check the wipers in the front of the truck. A few moments later, I see Les running toward the cab of the truck with his shoe in one hand. This is getting too strange for me. Little did I notice, the truck was in gear and it was going down the median of the freeway. It was so dark and so rainy that I did not notice the truck moving.

Les grabbed the steering wheel of the truck and pulled himself in with his shoe in one hand. I asked him, "What are you doing." He said, "I forgot to put the truck in park."

Les put the truck in park and put on his shoe. We got the wipers working and we were on our way again.

One mile later the wipers quit working again in the same driving rain storm. We pulled over. Got the wipers working and they worked all the way to the river.

It wasn't funny at the time, because something awful could have happed to either one of us. I did wait until we arrived at the river to ask Les, "Was their much traffic when you were running down I-5 with one shoe on?"

By the way, we did catch three Steelhead that day and got home safely.

Fishing with Bait Part II

I hoped you noticed by now the illustrations that I put together on using bait for salmon. One illustration depicted using Anchovies and the other depicted using Herring. I made up both illustrations because; put quite simply; many anglers do not understand the proper way to rig bait. There is probably nothing worse to use for fishing than natural bait rigged improperly. I seriously mean that! If you are going to use bait, do it correctly.

The reason I want to bring up using bait with or without flashers is this: Many anglers have been asking me how to rig bait. They want to use bait. They have tried using bait. But, they lack the confidence that their rigs are effective. One of the toughest choices anglers make (myself included); is to change rigs when you have confidence in your favorite rig. Example: I use a Green Hot Spot flasher with a Red Stripe, accompanied with a 3.5 Kingfisher Red Racer spoon. It is hard to change! We are creatures of comfort.

Back to Bait Basics: No matter what kind of bait you use the leader size and length will always remain the same. The leader will always be 30lb monofilament or 40lb fluorocarbon. The length of the leader for using bait will be 60".

So, what is the difference between using bait and using artificial lures? The difference is this: 1) The rotating action of the flasher will whip the bait off the hooks. 2) The bait holder head if used properly will provide action to the bait.

There are two natural baits to consider using for salmon: Herring or Anchovies. The rigs for these two baits are slightly different. So, let's take an in depth view

for using either one.

Herring: All of us have used Herring at one time for salmon. Most anglers who have tried herring have migrated back to spoons or plastic squid. Everyone can be an expert herring fisherman if you follow my tips and advice.

Herring right out of the freezer is hard to deal with effectively if you think you are going to stick it on a hook and then fish it on a downrigger. Almost every time you check your bait, you will be checking two hooks with no bait. Very frustrating?

I very highly recommend using Rhys Davis Super Herring Heads. These are easy to rig and the herring rarely comes out of the holder or off the hooks. Like everything else in this world, there are a couple of tricks that will make this rig effective. The hook tie is the most important step in rigging a Rhys Davis Herring holder. You must scale the hooks to fit the herring. There is not a one step formula for all sizes of herring. Click Here to see Rhys Davis Herring Holders.

Hook Tie: Hooks for a five inch Herring should be two 3/0 hooks. Hooks for 6" Herring should be two 4/0 hooks. Hooks for 7" Herring should be two 5/0 hooks. I recommend using 5" herring for winter Chinook fishing and 6" Herring for summer Chinook. The only issue here is that Herring has been getting tougher to get, especially in different sizes. When you tie your hooks, make sure that the rear hook is never longer than the tail of the Herring. I tie my hooks so that the rear hook only goes as far as where the tail of the Herring begins from the body of the herring.

The Holder: Put the head of the Herring in the bait holder head. Put a round toothpick through the hole in the bait holder head, through the head of the

herring and through the hole on the opposite side of the bait holder head. Clip the tooth pick off with a scissor. Click Here for illustration

The Hooks: Rig the leader through the back hole in the holder, in through the hole on the side and then through the hole at the front of the bait holder. This is easier done on land than on a boat. Have our rigs tied up in advance. Put a toothpick in the hole where you first inserted the leader and break it off. This keeps the lead and hooks from pulling forward when you are fishing.

Inserting the Hook: This tip makes or breaks the effectiveness of this rig. Insert the front hook in the lateral line of the herring. When the hook is completely inserted, there should be a very small gap between the eye of the hook and the bait holder. Let the back hook dangle. The reason that you leave this small gap: this gap will allow you to pull on the leader to put the slightest bend in the Herring. This will allow you to adjust the spin of the Herring. If you put the Herring in the water to test the spin and it just wanders around, pull on the leader to put a bit more bend in the Herring. This bend I am talking about is barely noticeable.

Anchovies: Preparing Anchovies involves one more step than rigging Herring with a bait holder. This one step is salting the Anchovies while they are thawing. Anchovies are noticeably softer than Herring because they are rich in oil content. I always like to compare Anchovies to putting bread in water. That's just a joke. But, they are softer and you have toughen them up. I usually pour a small amount of salt directly on the Anchovies. After a while, the Anchovies will begin to wrinkle. At that time, put them in a pail with just enough water to cover them up.

One thing I like about using 5" Anchovies, they obliviously look like the real thing. They are also a good candlefish imitation. Candlefish are abundant in Puget Sound.

Hook tie: With Anchovies the hook tie is similar to herring, only using smaller hooks tied closer together. Use two 2/0 hooks for 5" and 5 ½" Anchovies. Use two 3/0 hooks for 6" Anchovies.

Hooks: Rig the holder exactly like I described for rigging Herring.

The Holder: Put the Anchovy head in the holder. Use the red pins that come with the holders to pin the anchovy to the Holder. Follow the same steps that I described with herring. Click Here to see Rhys Davis Anchovy head holders.

Inserting the Hook: Use the same method that I described with Herring including letting the back hook dangle. Do use caution when inserting the front hook into the Anchovy. The Anchovy is soft even after you salt them; therefore they are easy to tear. If you tear the Anchovy, get a new fish out and start over. If you don't, the fish will tear apart and be a mess. No self-respecting salmon will want your Anchovy if it looks ripped up. How would you like going to restaurant only to find that your steak was shredded before it was served? The point is: Make the bait look presentable and real.

I believe that if you use the tips that I just presented, you will find bait fishing for salmon to be enjoyable and not just a skill reserved for the most experienced angler. Use your new skills to broaden and deepen your knowledge of effective ways to catch salmon. If you catch a salmon using

Salmon Cakes Recipe

Get your Pink Salmon out of the freezer and prepare a great winter salmon dinner. I will dare you to tell me that you are eating Pink Salmon!

Did I say Pink Salmon in the month of February? My Wife and I recently prepared some Pink's this way and thought they were very delicious.

If you vacuumed packed your Pink Salmon from last summer, it is time to get them out of the freezer and use them before you start catching some fresh salmon. I think you will be quite surprised to find out how tasty they are prepared the way I am about to tell you.

Take a fillet of Pink Salmon and bake it in the over at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes. No spices or salt need to be added. Take it out of the oven and let it cool. Remove the bones.

Mix the salmon thoroughly with Zartarain's Salmon Cake mix. Mix with 12-16 ounces of salmon. Mix with ½ cup mayonnaise, 1 egg, ½ cup of cold water.

Allow to stand in refrigerator for 30 minutes

Mold salmon cake mixture. Make the salmon cake whatever size you wish.

Fry in 1/8 inch pre-heated oil (340degrees F) until golden brown. About two minutes on each side.

Serve the salmon cakes with tartar sauce or lemon wedges.
